

2026-2027 FLORIDA GREEK STANDARDS ACCREDITATION POLICY

UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA | OFFICE OF SORORITY & FRATERNITY LIFE

The Florida Greek Standards Accreditation Program (FGS) is a set of guidelines and achievements that establishes minimum operating standards for social sororities and fraternities at the University of Florida, as well as opportunities for demonstrating success above and beyond the minimum expectations.

Based on the community's pillars of scholarship, leadership, service, and community, FGS is designed to identify and encourage high ideals, principles, and standards, critical to the success of each organization and its members. Through the FGS assessment, the progress of each chapter can be monitored.

In addition to complying with all applicable rules, regulations, policies, and procedures established by the University, Office of Sorority and Fraternity Life (OSFL), and designated governing councils, social sororities and fraternities at the University of Florida are expected to maintain accreditation by achieving the necessary requirements contained in the FGS.

Per policy 3.1: Minimum Standards for Recognition & Good Standing, a sorority or fraternity may undergo a review to determine status of recognition due to continued failure to follow and comply with University rules, policies, and/or guidelines. Review of recognition revocation will be conducted by the executive vice presidents of the governing councils at the time of the violation.

1. The chapter fails to provide chapter support information, documentation or fails to update information as requested by the University and OSFL.
2. The chapter fails to participate in mandatory training programs for the University of OSFL.
3. The chapter is found to be accepting or recruiting members that are not currently enrolled degree-seeking University of Florida students who has paid the annual Activities and Service Fee.
4. A chapter fails to maintain active membership within its respective governing council.
5. A chapter does not meet the minimum requirement for accreditation through the Florida Greek Standards Policy, two consecutive academic years in the row.

Accreditation Program Assessment

Chapters will report and/or submit to the OSFL, completion of/or compliance with the FGS. The process of collecting and recording completion of standards will be defined by the OSFL. Upon the end of each academic year (summer semester – spring semester), OSFL staff will assess all registered UF social sororities and fraternities based upon the chapter's completion requirements and additional opportunities within FGS. Submissions will be due and assessed each Fall and Spring semester. Events must be submitted by the deadline of the semester in which the event occurred. Retroactive submissions will not be accepted.

6. **Fall deadline:** December 1, 2026
7. **Spring deadline:** April 1, 2027

After all submissions are reviewed, each chapter will receive an official designation reflecting their achievement for the previous academic year. The chapter will maintain that designation until the following academic year. Chapters who receive certain designations will be eligible for Greek Awards as determined by OSFL. ACCREDITATION PROGRAM ASSESSMENT

SECTION 1: SCHOLARSHIP

Requirements

8. Chapter must maintain a semester chapter GPA of at least 2.85 for both active and new members.
(Reports will be pulled by OSFL). Penalties will apply if the overall NM semester GPA falls below 2.85.
9. Chapter must have an elected or appointed Scholarship/Academic Chair each semester.
10. Chapter must submit a scholarship/academic plan that describes the following:
 11. How the chapter supports members in maintaining a high academic standard.
 12. Programs/initiatives that the chapter hosts to promote academic excellence.
13. Does the chapter require a minimum GPA for members to be considered in good standing for the chapter? If so, what is the minimum GPA requirement?
14. How the chapter holds members accountable for maintaining the minimum GPA.

Additional Opportunities (*)

15. Chapter maintains an overall (active and new members combined) semester GPA of 3.0 or above.
(Reports will be pulled by OSFL).
16. Chapter maintains an overall (active and new members combined) semester GPA above the All-Greek Average for that semester. (Reports will be pulled by OSFL)

Requirements

17. Chapter must elect or appoint a Service Chair each semester.
18. **Fall Semester:** Chapter must organize at least 2 service projects **AND** at least 1 philanthropy project. All 3 projects must be submitted through [The Gators For Good Network](#): Powered by GivePulse by the Fall FGS deadline to receive points. *(The projects must be hosted by the chapter, not participating in another chapter's/student organization's events).*
19. **Spring Semester:** Chapter must organize at least 2 service projects **AND** at least 1 philanthropy project. All 3 projects must be submitted through [The Gators For Good Network](#): Powered by GivePulse, by the Spring FGS deadline to receive points. *(The projects must be hosted by the chapter, not participating in another chapter's/student organization's events)*

Additional Opportunities (*)

Fall semester

20. Chapter organizes 1 service or philanthropy project in the Fall **with at least 50% of the chapter participating**. The project must be submitted through [The Gators For Good Network](#): Powered by GivePulse by the Fall FGS deadline. (The project must be hosted by the chapter, not participating in another chapter's/student organization's event). This event can be an event submitted for the Fall required service/philanthropy event.
21. Chapter participates in another chapter's philanthropic event outside of their own council. Monetary donations will not count. (Examples: Chapter registers a team for a chapter's athletic event, chapter attends another chapter's philanthropic forum, chapter writes cards/makes items for another chapter's event, chapter.) This event can be an event submitted for the Spring required service/philanthropy event.

Spring semester:

22. Chapter organizes 1 service or philanthropy project in the Spring ***with at least 50% of the chapter participating***. The project must be submitted through [The Gators For Good Network](#): Powered by GivePulse by the Spring FGS deadline. (The project must be hosted by the chapter, not participating in another chapter's/student organization's event).
23. Chapter participates in another chapter's philanthropic event outside of their own council. Monetary donations will not count. (Examples: Chapter registers a team for a chapter's athletic event, chapter attends another chapter's philanthropic forum, chapter writes cards/makes items for another chapter's event, chapter.

Suggested Role of Service Chair

24. Organize chapter service (volunteer) projects and philanthropic events/projects
25. Collaborate with chapters and organizations as needed to facilitate cooperative programming and effective program management
26. Be knowledgeable of and maximize use of available university resources to aid in provide service and philanthropic donations to the community.

Helpful Hints

27. Choose a community service/volunteer project or philanthropic cause that a majority of chapter members resonate with
28. To enhance the impact, take time as a chapter to reflect on the activities, impact to the community, and personal growth.
29. Participate in collaborative service projects and/or philanthropic events with organizations from different councils.

SECTION 3: LEADERSHIP

Requirements

30. Chapter president must attend annual Greek Advance leadership retreat. (Chapter will lose FGS points if this requirement is not met).
31. Chapter has at least 25% of members participate in a campus-based leadership opportunity. Examples: leadership roles in a registered student organization (RSO), leadership development or mentorship programs, leadership retreats, etc. Other opportunities can be approved by OSFL.
32. Chapter has at least 50% of members involved in and/or holding membership in an campus-based organization. Examples: membership in a registered student organization (RSO), college/department ambassadors, Student Government, etc.

Additional Opportunities (*)

33. Chapter sends required attendees to any of its regional/state/(inter)national leadership training programs or conventions annually. If the organization does not have an annual leadership opportunity, the chapter may send appropriate representation to a general fraternal leadership experience such as the Undergraduate Interfraternity Institute (UIFI) or other comparable programs approved by OSFL.
34. Chapter has members who serve a full term in a Greek leadership position outside of the chapter.
35. Recruitment Counselors: Panhellenic Recruitment Counselors (Pi Chi), IFC Recruitment Advisors (Rho Alphas)
36. Thrive IFC & Panhellenic SSA Executive/Directors Board: Executive Board Members or Directors within IFC Thrive and Panhellenic Sister Support Ambassadors.
37. Florida Greek Ambassador: Active member of FGA.
38. Greek Council Directors: Directors-level roles within the 4 Governing Greek Councils
39. Greek Council Executive Board: Executive Board roles within the 4 Governing Greek Councils
40. Order of Omega Executive Board: Executive Board roles within Order of Omega
41. State/Regional/National Leadership: Positions on the State, Regional, or National Board. This can include volunteer, paid, and/or internship roles.
42. What will NOT count towards this section: Thrive IFC Ambassadors, and Panhellenic Sister Support Ambassadors.
43. Chapter member enrolls in a UF Greek Leadership Class and passes the course with a B or higher. (Presidents Class or Emerging Leaders Class).

SECTION 4: COMMUNITY

Requirements

44. Chapter must collaborate with at least 1 other non-Greek Registered Student Organizations (RSO) to plan and implement a program at least once per semester. The co-hosted program may be educational, service/philanthropic, or social (alcohol-free) in nature. Exchange dinners will not count to satisfy this requirement. All RSOs can be found on [GatorConnect](#). A program or event that counts toward another standard in this policy can count here.
45. Chapter must collaborate with at least 1 other registered Greek organization outside of their council to plan and implement a program at least once per semester. The co-hosted program may be educational, service/philanthropic, or social (alcohol-free) in nature. Exchange dinners will not count to satisfy this requirement. A program or event that counts toward another standard in this policy can count here.

Additional Opportunities (*)

46. Chapter implements additional co-hosted programs that are educational, service/philanthropic, or social (alcohol-free). Exchange dinners will not count to satisfy this requirement.

SECTION 5: ALUMNI/ALUMNAE RELATIONS

Many social sororities and fraternities attribute the rich history of their chapters generally to their alumni/alumnae. Alumni/alumnae serve critical roles such as advisors, trustees, members of house corporations, and financial contributors. To maintain a positive relationship with alumni/alumnae and further the principles of sisterhood/brotherhood, the following are requirements:

Alumni/alumnae events are specifically tailored for alumni/alumnae. While undergraduate chapter members may attend, these events should be designed to engage former students or members of the institution or organization.

Requirements

- 47. Chapter must organize and host one alumni/alumnae event per year.
- 48. Examples include Founder's Day/Week, alumni social, Alumni Homecoming event, etc. Inviting alumni/ae to New Member Initiation or other pre-existing events do NOT satisfy this requirement.
- 49. Chapter must elect or appoint an Alumni/Alumnae Chair each semester.

Additional Opportunities (*)

- 50. Chapter creates and submits a newsletter to their alumni/alumnae, outlining the chapter's achievements for that semester. Electronic newsletters or other online methods of communication will be acceptable.
- 51. Chapter organizes and hosts an additional alumni/alumnae event per semester such as Founder's Day/Week, Alumni Homecoming event, etc.

SECTION 6: RISK MANAGEMENT

All chapters shall adhere to all local, state, and federal laws, University regulations and policies including the Student Code of Conduct, OSFL policies, and policies of the respective governing council. Violations of law and/or policy will be subject to the Greek conduct process and/or the respective council judicial and accountability processes and could result in sanctions or outcomes. Examples of sanctions or outcomes could include loss of event permit approvals, loss of social privileges, loss of use of University space, monetary fines, educational sanctions, loss of FGS points, or loss of chapter recognition.

Requirements

52. Chapters must send the required attendees to the Risk & Safety Summit hosted by OSFL at the beginning of each semester. All required members must be in attendance to receive credit. *Loss of FGS points, and loss of event permit approvals will apply if attendance is not met.*
53. If a required officer cannot attend due to an academic conflict, a proxy may be sent in their place with prior approval of OSFL. Excuses and proxy approvals must be submitted via email at least 48 hours before the Risk & Safety Summit.
54. All active members and new members must complete the Hazing 101 Module by the date set by the OSFL. This is an annual educational module.
55. Chapter New Member Educator and Chapter President must attend the appropriate New Member Educator Training each semester. New Member Educator Training is hosted by the OSFL.
56. Chapter must participate in 2 or more alcohol-free social events each semester. The event may be a closed sisterhood/brotherhood function or be co-hosted with another registered student organization. Exchange dinners will not count to satisfy this requirement.
57. Chapter must host/conduct at least 1 seminar, guest speaker, and/or presentation concerning bystander intervention, alcohol, drugs, hazing, sexual assault prevention and/or similar topic each semester, where at least 50% of the chapter is in attendance per program per semester.
58. At least 75% of the new member class must participate in a training program which focuses on bystander intervention, alcohol, drugs, hazing, sexual assault prevention, and/or similar topic provided during the new membership process or during that semester of their initiation.
59. New member class must meet the required percentage of chapter representation in the new member retreat/new member orientation hosted by OSFL and council executive board.

Conduct Violations: If a chapter is found responsible for violating the University of Florida Code of Conduct, the chapter will lose points from the chapter's overall score. The penalty points will be deducted during the assessment term (fall, spring, summer) in which the violation occurred. If the conduct process is not concluded by the end of the assessment term (i.e. by the end of the spring semester deadline) for that violation, points will be retroactively deducted.

SECTION 7: ADMINISTRATION

Requirements

60. Chapter must maintain accurate contact information for the chapter leadership, chapter advisors, and house director/house corporation (if applicable), and house corporation (if applicable) with OSFL.
61. Chapter must submit required paperwork (i.e. Intake Intent Form, New Member Report Form, Anti-Hazing Commitment Form, Initiation Report Form, etc.) to OSFL by the required date(s).
62. Chapter must maintain an active chapter advisor or chapter advisory board. If the chapter has an advisory board, one person should be designated as the primary chapter advisor and should meet the requirements as defined below in "Role of Chapter Advisor."
63. Chapters must ensure online chapter rosters (managed by OSFL) are accurate by the required dates (Fall, Spring, and Summer).
64. Chapter president must conduct a one-on-one meeting with his or her council advisor (OSFL staff member) at least once per academic year.
65. Chapter president must attend at minimum 75% of Chapter President's Meetings hosted by OSFL each semester.
66. Each chapter advisor must conduct a one-on-one meeting with their council advisor (OSFL staff member) at least once per academic year.
67. The chapter advisor or at least one member of the chapter advisory board must attend the annual chapter advisor workshop held by the OSFL.
68. Chapter must abide by their respective council's 6-week initiation/intake window designated by OSFL. All new member education, new member activities, initiation, and new member presentation shows and reveals must be completed within the designated new member window.
69. Chapter must complete the annual organization registration/re-registration process on time to be a recognized/active member of one of the four governing councils (Interfraternity Council, Multicultural Greek Council, National Pan-Hellenic Council, Panhellenic Council). If the chapter submits their registration/re-registration late, or fails to submit their registration/re-registration, the chapter may be subject to loss of FGS points and/or recognition as an organization at the University of Florida.

Annual Chapter Registration Items

The following will be required as part of the annual organization registration/re-registration process with the Office of Sorority and Fraternity Life through the Department of Student Engagement.

70. Chapter must maintain liability insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000 for un-housed chapters and \$2,000,000 for housed chapters. The University of Florida Board of Trustees must be named as additional insured. (OSFL will maintain all current certificates of insurance. Chapter presidents will be prompted by OSFL to provide updated information ONLY upon expiration of COR. Failure to maintain a current COI on file with OSFL may result in delays in the event permitting process or denial of event permits).
71. Proof of active affiliation with the chapter's International/National Organization.
72. Accurate roster information of all members.
73. Current chapter officers.
74. Chapter advisor verification (this includes the name of the primary chapter advisor, phone, email, and city of residence).

75. A copy of the chapter's local constitution and bylaws which should outline the chapter's judicial/accountability process.
76. A completed Anti-Hazing Commitment form signed by Chapter Presidents, New Member Educators, and Chapter Advisors.

Role of a Chapter Advisor

An active, involved chapter advisor or advisory board is a key ingredient to a successful chapter. Accordingly, each chapter must have a chapter advisor who either lives or works within the immediate Gainesville area or has approval from the chapter's Inter/National organization to serve as the chapter advisor if they do not reside in the Gainesville area. If the advisor is an alumni/alumna of the sorority or fraternity chapter at the University of Florida, they must be at least 3 years removed from their undergraduate experience (unless a specific exemption is granted by the University in conjunction with the Inter/National organization). The advisor should have the relevant experience necessary to provide the chapter and individual members with continuing advice and support. The advisor should:

77. Attend most chapter meetings
78. Attend Chapter Advisor meetings/trainings scheduled by OSFL
79. Communicate regularly with OSFL advisors
80. Assist with chapter-sponsored events and programs
81. Work closely with the chapter executive board in the execution of their duties
82. Assist the chapter in preparing and implementing chapter budgets, goals, event management, and crisis management procedures
83. Be knowledgeable about relevant University policies, guidelines, and procedures
84. Be knowledgeable of the rules and regulations of the Inter/National organization

SECTION 8: FACILITY MANAGEMENT (if applicable)

Facility management, when properly executed, ensures a residential environment that is safe and secure, conducive to learning, and is aesthetically pleasing within the larger University community.

According to [Florida Statute 806.101 False alarms of fire](#). – Whoever, without reasonable cause, by outcry or the ringing of bells, or otherwise, makes or circulates, or causes to be made or circulated, a false alarm of fire, shall for the first conviction be guilty of a misdemeanor of the first degree, punishable as provided in [s.775.082](#) or [s.775.083](#). A second or subsequent conviction under this section shall constitute a felony of the third degree, punishable as provided in [s.775.082](#), [s.775.083](#), or [s.775.084](#).

Repeat offenses of false fire alarms or tampering of fire safety equipment will result in loss of Florida Greek Standard points and potential fines by Environmental Health and Safety (EH&S) and the City of Gainesville. This could also result in student conduct action through the Office of Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution. Each case will be reviewed by the Director of Sorority and Fraternity Life or their designee and referred accordingly.

Requirements

85. Chapter with a recognized live-in facility must be in compliance with the Chapter Facility Policy for Social Sororities and Fraternities.
86. The chapter facility must maintain a Level 1 or Level 2 rating for each Fire Safety Inspection.
87. Level 3 rating includes an automatic loss of the privilege of hosting events (excluding meals and chapter meetings) in the facility until the violations are corrected and written documentation is submitted to EH&S confirming the corrective actions.
88. Please refer policy 3.4: Chapter Facility Compliance to review the Fire Inspection Evaluation Ratings in full.
89. Chapter house director (HD) must attend the appropriate trainings held by the OSFL annually.

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SECTION 9: STUDENT LIFE INITIATIVES

The Office of Sorority and Fraternity Life operates within the University of Florida Division of Student Life. As part of the University of Florida Greek community, chapters are encouraged to contribute to the OSFL and the larger University community. Student Life Initiatives will vary throughout each semester depending on programs and needs hosted by OSFL or other UF offices and departments. These initiatives are not required but are considered “additional opportunities” for the chapter to go above and beyond the minimum expectations for FGS. Opportunities will be uploaded to a living document published on www.greeks.ufl.edu. Loss of points will apply if members sign up/register for Student Life Initiatives and fail to show up at the event.

Student Life Initiatives must be pre-approved by the OSFL before points are assigned to the opportunity. Unapproved Student Life Initiatives will not be considered for points through FGS. All approved Student Life Initiatives will be listed in the living document published on www.greeks.ufl.edu.

CHAPTER DESIGNATIONS



3-Star Chapter: Chapter of Excellence

Points: 700 and above

These chapters have gone above and beyond the expectations of social sororities and fraternities, demonstrating excellence through the milestones outlined in Florida Greek Standards. These chapters have earned at least 90% of the possible allotted points through the Florida Greek Standards requirements and/or the additional opportunities.

2-Star Chapter: Outstanding Chapter

Points: 620-699

These chapters met and exceeded most expectations for social sororities and fraternities, as outlined in Florida Greek Standards. These chapters have earned at least 80% of the possible allotted points through the Florida Greek Standards requirements and/or the additional opportunities.

1-Star Chapter: Satisfactory Chapter

Points: 540-619

These chapters have met the minimum expectations for social sororities and fraternities as outlined in Florida Greek Standards. These chapters have earned at least 70% of the possible allotted through the Florida Greek Standards requirements and/or the additional opportunities.

No Star Rating: Unsatisfactory Chapter

Points: Below 540

These chapters have not met the minimum expectations for Social Sororities and Fraternities, as outlined in Florida Greek Standards. These chapters have earned less than 70% of the possible allotted points through achieving Florida Greek Standards requirements and/or the additional opportunities.

Unsatisfactory Chapters will be required to meet with the Florida Greek Standards Review Committee at the end of the assessment period. The chapter will be required to create and present a corrective plan of action to the Committee. The Committee will then recommend to the Director of Sorority and Fraternity Life or their designee, what actions should be taken with the chapter.

FLORIDA GREEK STANDARDS REVIEW COMMITTEE

When a chapter achieves the status of Unsatisfactory Chapter, the chapter shall be referred to the Florida Greek Standards Review Committee. OSFL will provide information to each council's Executive Vice President (EVP) regarding those chapters in Unsatisfactory Standing for that year. The Executive Vice President shall convene the FGS committee and schedule meetings with the chapter leadership of those Unsatisfactory Standing Chapters. These meetings should occur prior to the beginning of the Fall semester.

FGS Review Committee Members

- 90. Committee Chairperson: Executive Vice President (EVP) of the chapter's respective council. The EVP shall coordinate the review meeting.
- 91. Professional staff member from OSFL (not the Director of Sorority and Fraternity Life).
- 92. The EVPs from the 4 Greek Governing Councils

FGS Review Meeting

Purpose: To afford the chapter leadership the opportunity to provide information to the committee as to why the chapter did not meet accreditation and to discuss and collaborate on necessary actions or strategies for the chapter to achieve and maintain compliance.

Required Attendees: Chapter president and a secondary chapter leader. The chapter advisor, house corporation board member(s), and/or the house director may be required to attend the meeting.

Outcomes: After the meeting, a recommendation for corrective measures will be provided to the Director of Sorority and Fraternity Life. The Director will review the recommendations and make a final determination relative to the corrective actions the chapter must take.

Failure to Meet Florida Greek Standards Accreditation

If a chapter fails to meet the minimum requirement for accreditation outlined in the Florida Greek Standards Policy for 2 or more consecutive academic years, the Florida Greek Standards Review Committee will make a recommendation to the Director of Sorority and Fraternity Life for or against the loss of recognition of the chapter. If recognition of the chapter is revoked, the chapter must work with the OSFL and the appropriate governing council to return to campus upon demonstration of a strategy to meet and maintain FGS requirements as well as any terms and conditions as may be deemed appropriate by the Director of Sorority and Fraternity Life.

Code of Conduct Violations: If a chapter is found responsible for violating the University of Florida Code of Conduct, the chapter will lose points from the chapter's overall score. The penalty points will be deducted during the assessment term (fall, spring, summer) in which the violation occurred. If the conduct process is not concluded by the end of the assessment term (i.e. by the end of the spring semester deadline) for that violation, points will be retroactively deducted. If the chapter, then falls into Unsatisfactory Chapter Status and the Florida Greek Standards Review Committee meetings have already been conducted, the chapter will undergo a review conducted by and OSFL staff members and the chapter's respective council EVP only.
